Dear Senator Kennedy:

Your mother and your brother, Ted, know how delighted we are at your election. I wish that they could express this to your wife and also our most sincere congratulations to her as well as yourself on the birth of your son. We feel this especially since our first cousin, Palmer Phelan Atkinson Hughes, is a first cousin of Phelan Beal who is your wife's uncle by marriage. As a native Georgian, even such an attenuated relationship counts.

Please, therefore, do not think me impertinent in recommending for the position of Secretary of State my friend and fellow Georgian, Bugene Black, whose family and mine were friends for a century or more.

He combines the knowledge, strength of character, patrictism, and courage which will characterize, I believe, the members of your cabinet. In addition to this, he has the respect and admiration of the entire world. He belongs to a family which, like all of us, was reduced by the Civil Mar; nevertheless, rose to positions of great influence and eminence. His uncle, Supreme Court Justice William Harman Black of New York, was my mother's close friend and mine for many years. I shall take the liberty of writing you further about the international situation. Since, for the last two years, most of my effort has been drawn toward getting the present administration to follow the counsels of the Founders of our Republic, but also, these efforts met with little or no success. Lear Gene,

There is an urgent need in Washington of a Foreign Service Center where foreign diplomats, representatives of the international organizations, members of Congress, American Foreign Service and State Department personnel and private persons interested in international affairs could meet for both social and educational purposes.

Such contact is necessary in the effective promotion of United States foreign policy and the maintenance of friendly international relations. At present there is no focal point and facility available for this purpose.

The purpose of this letter is not fund raising. It is only to request the privilege of adding your name to the list of members of the Committee endorsing the project. It is expected that the financing will be provided out of public funds.

The project was initiated by an informal committee including The Honorable Robert Woods Bliss, The Honorable Myron M. Cowen, The Honorable David Key, Mr. Charles Baldwin, Mr. Leo Goodman, Mr. Dumond Peck Hill, Mr. Walter Sterling Surrey and Mr. Philip Watts. They asked me to become Chairman to initiate the planning. The project enjoys the approval of the Department of State, the American Foreign Service Association as well as the endorsement of more than forty of the Chiefs of Diplomatic Missions in Washington.

It is thus my pleasure to invite you to be a member of the Committee for the Foreign Service Center. It is emphasized that your participation entails no financial responsibility whatever.

It is our hope to obtain the necessary authorization and appropriations from the Congress for the acquisition of land and the construction of a building. These facilities would be leased at a nominal rental to a non-profit organization to be formed for the purpose. As you may know, there is precedent for such an undertaking. The military services, for example, provide similar facilities.

What is contemplated is a needed meeting place in Washington for a variety of persons who have a common interest in the vitally important area of world affairs. Our position as a great world power and our necessity to promote favorable international understanding make this a matter of national interest.

The inclusion of your name among those on the Committee would do much to further this necessary project. Your concurrence and comments would be most appreciated.

Dear Mr. Black,

I am writing to thank you for your exceedingly thoughtful volume, "The Diplomacy of Economic Development", which I received upon registering for the Annual Meeting in Washington. I read your book shortly after receiving it and I had intended to write you a word immediately thereafter. Now that I have gone through the book a second time, I shall not lose a further moment in telling you how stimulating I found it and how satisfying it has been in articulating for me a number of unexpressed thoughts on the subject treated by you.

Your use of the term "development diplomacy" is a happy one, in that it succinctly implies that development requires the vision, depth, knowledge, subtlety and patience of diplomacy in its highest and most encompassing meaning.

Another passage among your lectures which I thought of real value was that on the nature of the planning process. Appreciation of the concept of planning (too often confused with regimentation) continues to elude many otherwise perceptive people despite unabated discussion of the subject, and I think your remarks succeed in reducing the heat which surrounds the topic and in increasing the light thrown upon it.

But of all the passages in the book, those which emphasize the importance of a sense of vocation and its relationship to the problems of development were the most gratifying to read. Although one is not always overwhelmed by its prevalence in Wall Street or elsewhere,

one is sometimes surprised by the flashes of it which occur even among the most unlikely people. Those of us who have some contact with the investment aspect of foreign development have seen people in Wall Street and among institutional investors who, after being satisfied that a given investment abroad was a sound one, were basically motivated to act by considerations that derive from more profound sources than the narrow rhythm of daily activity. There may be no easy formula for quickly and effectively implanting a sense of vocation in people who do not already have it, but I think that your book is a most worthy contribution, not only to an increased understanding of the problems to which you address yourself, but also to nourishing whatever sense of vocation does lurk in us.

I hope that you are well and that you are on the job again with your accustomed vigor.

Here also is the printed version of the DAG paper that you took a special interest in. We never did have a chance to report back to you on distribution, so let me mention now that we have had 10,000 copies of the pamphlet printed, and will make an initial distribution of around 8,500 in the United States and elsewhere. As part of the distribution outside the United States, it will go to 700 or more officials of central banks and of ministries concerned with finance, economic affairs and other aspects of economic development; and the Paris office will have 500 copies to distribute to European banks. In the United States, we will distribute around 1,200 copies to banks and to government officials; the biggest single group of recipients will be some 3,800 members of the American Economic Association, who include financial analysts and corporation executives as well as teachers of economics. When the Annual Meeting is over, we will once more ask the Area Departments for additional suggestions. By this afternoon, we will have a number of other new editions of Bank publications from the printer, and we will make up a packet to send you, so that you can see what will be available at the Annual Meeting.
