## Dear Mr. President:

Thank you very much for your letter of January 15, 1978 from which I was interested to learn about your Government's plans for investment in infrastructure and water resources. I was also very pleased to meet with Dr. Hilda again, during his recent visit to Washington, to review recent economic developments and the progress of the Bank Group's activities in Bangladesh since my visit to Naca in November 1976.

While the need to reduce the rapid growth of population and to increase agricultural productivity are the main priorities in the effort to raise living standards, I agree with you that the developinent of basic infrastructure facilities is of great significance in improving the quality of the lives of the poorest people in both the rural and urban areas. Road transport, housing and employment for the urban poor are important sectors in this connection.

Regarding transport, a sector in which the Bank Group has long experience in many countries, including Bangladesh, we shall be glad to review the Government's Master Plan for road development when it is ready. In the meantime, based on our experience with the first highway project (Credit 408-3D), the findings of the Bangladesh Transport Survey (1974), and our review of specific project proposals received from your Government, we believe that improved highway maintenance and the rehabilitation of the existing highway system are the first priority in the immediate future. Accordingly, we have proposed a plan of action to be undertaken by the Roads and Highways Department (Rib), with technical assistance, aimed at preparing highway maintenance and rehabilitation projects suitable for IDA financing during the next two years. We will also be prepared to consider a rural roads project following the completion later this year of studies now in progress with USAID assistance.

Regarding urban housing and employment, the Bank Group does not at present finance projects in either sector, although we have assisted sites and services projects and urban development schemes in a few countries, mainly in Asia and Africa. We would be glad to share our experience with you if this would be helpful. However, because of our own limited experience and resources in these new areas, the wide range
of sectors in which we are already involved in Bangladesh and the policy conatraints neneioned above, I regret that we are ualikely to be able to assist directiy in the near future. You uay vish to have Dr. Huda raise chese issues with members of the Bangiadesh Add Group at ita next meeting in June.

Finally, with respect to the development of the Brahamaputra and Ganges river basivs, I shall follow with interest your discussions with India and liepal and hope that arrangewents for cooperation between the three countriea concerned can be eatablished soos. If requested by the three governments, the Rant Group will be prepared to assist in the mobilization of the necessary financial and technieal assistance. Heanwhile, we are reviewing the recently conpleted Southwest Region Studies and vould be glad te receive the Government's proposaia for the preparation of projects in this area, which could proceed independently of any regional development schemes resulting from discussions with India and Iepal.

My wife aad I very much enjoyed our last visit to Bangladesh and we appreciate your renewed invitation. You will know already that Mr. W. David Hopper, recently appointed Regional Vice President, South Asia, plans to visit Dacea towards the end of March and he will be glad to call on you at that tine.

## Dear Harold:

It was very pleasant to hear from you again, and I would like to thank you for your interest.

The situation in the Bast Africa Community is this: negotiations between the three Governments, as well as with the World Bank, took place at the World Bank in Washington in early December. On that occasion, the partner states of the EAC selected Mr. Umbricht (a Swiss national) as the Mediator. He is now making the rounds of the three East African countries and their Presidents. Within about twelve months time he is expected to make proposals about equitable and permanent distribution of the assets and liabilities of the Community other than the East African Development Bank. The Bank has appointed Mr.Umbricht on behalf of the partner states and acts as the administrator for the entire activity. However, all future arrangements and appointments to carry out the assignment are in his hands, and the World Bank is, of course, anxious to maintain the independence of the Mediator.

I hope we shall meet again before long, and I shall always remember our former association with pleasure.

I. The U.S. has asked that the Bank "devise a means of associating the operations of the Bank with practical improvements in the general area of [human rights]."
a. In particular, the U.S. request reflects action in the Congress and decisions of the President (see Annex I).
II. Internationally recognized human rights include a wide variety of rights and in particular both civil rights and economic rights (see Annex II).
III. The U.S. proposal raises two questions:

1. If the Bank were to "associate the operations of the Bank with practical improvements -- in human rights", how would we do it?
2. Should we do it?
a. The legal implications (see Annex III).
b. The political effect.
IV. Action by the Bank to inject human rights considerations into its operations could take several forms:
a. The individual Executive Directors could reflect such considerations in their support for or rejection of particular loans.
b. The Board could adopt a statement of general principles supporting human rights (for example, accepting responsibility by the Bank for advancing economic rights and stating it would take account of judgments relating to civil rights when these have been formed by appropriate international bodies).
c. Determination by the Board that the management, when establishing the size and content of country lending programs, shall take account of civil rights considerations. (Discuss the issues that would be faced in pursuing such a policy, for example, what standards would be used; who would make the judgments; what coordination would there by with the IMF, regional banks, UNDP, etc.; what exceptions would be made; if financing of basic human needs is to be "excepted", what projects are to be considered "basic human need related"; what relative weight is to be given to "civil rights performance" vs. "economic rights performance"; how and when would the judgments relating to civil rights performance be discussed with the country affected.)

Having returned to Washington from a most enjoyable and useful trip to your country, let me express my deep gratitude for all your efforts and those of your collaborators and for the many courtesies and the warm hospitality extended to me and my associates throughout this visit. It was a pleasure to meet you and your colleagues of the Economic Group again and to continue, in a constructive, frank and cordial spirit, the dialogue which we began a few years ago and which has seen so many positive results. I particularly appreciated that you personally accomponied us on our trip to the Lake Nasser area which is so rich in history and culture and which could have an important potential for the future development of Egypt.

As agreed with your President, whom I had the honor of seeing in Cairo, I have in the meantime conveyed to him my main conclusions and impressions from wy visit. These concern four areas which I had the opportunity to discuss thoroughly with you and your colleagues: firstly, the overriding importance of giving attention to and taking action in the field of population control; secondly, the need for gradually reintroducing market mechanisms to achieve the most efficient use of Egypt's scarce resources and to provide incentives to its producers; thirdly, the risk of postponing decisions on difficult choices between investment and consumption by adopting overly ambitious growth and resource assumptions in the Five-Year Plan; finally, the need for further moves towards integration of economic and financial policies on the one hand and sector policies on the other, and the urgency of a review of the efficacy of Egypt's administrative structure in general.

As you know, after my visit to your country, I visited Saudi Arabia and Kxyeit. During my stay there I iniormed the highest authorities of these countries that I comsiler reel progress had been made by Egypt in 1977 and that to maintain and continue the improvements in 1978, adiditional generous contributions to Egypt's developnent vare cleariy justified. We made it clear thet, in the view of the Morld Bant, Egypt's need for special sssistance of an easily disburseble neture would exist, not only for an adaltional year but for a ionger jeriod, say, at least three years, albeit on a decreasing scale. We were asked whether the Yorla Sank would make available to CODE its viers on the magnitudes required in auch s ease. I repliad that we would do so if the Egyptian Covernment agreed. With the next Consultative Group neeting coming up very soon, it woula therefore seen to me that a direct approsch of the members of GODE by your Covernnent now would be both advisable and timely and that it should, this time, be more than en emergency request for a single year.

I have sleo teken the opportumity of wy letter to again convey to the President ny congratulations for the considerable achievements of lest year in which you have played such an important role. Let me repeat my promise that we stand ready to support increasingly your country's further efforts forsard sown end rapid development.

Dear Mr. President:

As I promised you when you were kind enough to receive me on January 21 in Cairo, I an writing you to share with you some of the impressions I gathered during ry visit to your country, and to convey to you some of ny thoughts on the most urgent economic issues facing your country. Before I do so, let me first thank you for the many courtesies sud the warm hospitality extended to me and my associates. I was much impressed with the constructive, frank and cordial spirit of the meetings we held with members of your Cabinet and other officials. I am particularly grateful to His Excellency the Prime Minister, the Deputy Prime Minister Dr. Kaissouni and his colleagues in the Economic Group, for their clear statements describing comprehensively the economic problems and opportunities challenging Egypt.

During my visit I was glad to note the improvements and successes in crucial economic policy areas which have been achieved in the last three years, but particularly in 1977. Most notable, of course, are the improvements in the financial and monetary fields where more focussed policies and improved coordination have led to a considerable strengthening of Egypt's foreign exchange position. I refer particularly to the extension of the parallel market and the dramatic improvement in the overall debt picture. Hot surprisingly, and as a consequence, public and private investments and foreign exchange earnings increased sharply. I vas pleased to be able to state in an international press conference on ny last day in Cairo that the new economic policies of the Government have enabled the World Bank to keep its own promise: our lending to Sept has increased sixfold from about \$h0 million yearly in 1974 to an average of about $\$ 250$ million a year over the past three years. Because of these improvements in the situation we have been able to
sponsor successfully a Consultative Groug for Egypt bringing together those countries and institutions which are provicing significant support for your development efforts. The resulting clingte hes, I think, contributed importantly to an incressed aid flow.

I believe, 㳑. President, that the opportunity may be at hand for Bgypt to consolidate the economic achievements of the recent past and to turia townals sadressing vigorously the longor term structural problems, which may have had to be neglected due to pressiag shortterm problens. While Egypt's economic situation is still very difficuit, its potential remains most promising. The task is to remove structural problens that impede the achievement of the potential.

## Allos me a fev observations in this respect.

A mafor long-tern end complex problem in my viev is the pressure of pepulation on Egypt's resources. It was most discouraging to get the news that Kgypt's amnual rate of population growth has risen to over 2.5 percent, one of the highest in the world. If this rate of increase contfnues, it vill fapese such a burden on Egypt's resources as to seriously threaten the possibilities of inaproviag living standards. I vas gled to note a change in attitude within the Government and in Beypt in this regard. I believe much more attention is given to this problem now; the Worla Bank is of course snxious to provide support in this Gifricult rield; it deserves the utmost attention of all concerned.

Nurther setions are required in the process of reintroanuing market mechanisms to achleve the most efricient use of scarce resources and to provide the necessary ineentives to Eyypt's producers. This sould include continued action in restoring eradually a realistie price framework and, in the foreiga exchange field, to meintein incentives for renittances fron Sgyptians living ebroad, as well as to ingrove सgypt's export earnings, including those from the Suez Canel and from cotton, the latter of which have been falling. Admittecky, action in this area cennot be precipitous, but it is of vital importance to the country thet movement in the rigit direction be sustained.

The Pive-Year Plan, the preparation of shich was a major step in the direction of organiaing Beypt's resources is undergtandably anditious. Bowever, in our viev it is overly sabitious in its erowth and resource assumptions for the years beyond 1976 , thereby creating a real wist of hasty decisions baving to be taken subsequently on difficult choices, betveen investment and conswaption.

If Eeypt's economic potentisl is to be fully exploited, an effective well-coordinated development adminiatretion is needed capeble of managing the large investment program and developing sound economic, finencial and sector policies. Under the aegis of the Prime Ninister, the situation has improved in 2977 . But, it seems to us that further moves tovards improved coordination of Goverment actions are needed in particular between the area of economic sad Pinanciel policies on the one hand and sector policies on the other. We have noticed that responaibilities for policy maicing and implementation, pricing, investment decisions, preparation and administration of legislation designed to promote developent are aivided among many more ministers than in most of the countries we are familiar with. Iraportant portfolios have changed hands very frequently. Matters requiring action can be hela up for months in the administrative process. This situation, while improving, is of course not supporting some of the nain objectives of the open-door poliey which you so courageously introduced in 1973, nanely, to bring in foreign investment snd to rationslise the economic development of Egypt. All these points reflect in wy view, an urgent need for a reviev of the efficacy of Egyt's auministrative structure.

In concluding, Mr. President, let me again express my gratitude to you and your associstes for the warm velcome extended to me and my collaborators. I congratulate all those tho are responsible for the impreasive economic achievements of last year and promise our readiness to support fully your country's further efforts torard sound and rapid development. If the policy improvements so well begun are continued, especially in the problem area referred to alove, I am conflient productive investment opportunities will develop allowing the World Benk and other donors in the Consultative Group to make even larger finencial contributions than in the recent pest. In this reapect, I have considered it y duty to inforin the highest authorities in Saud. Arabia and Kuwait, which I visited after my visit to your country, that I convidered that real progress had been made by Fgypt in 2977, and that to mantain and contiuue the improvements in 1978, additional generous contrlibutions to Reypt's development were clearly justified.

In your letter of December 28, 1977, you asked our views on the role of the International Financial Institutions in meeting the world drug problem, in particular, through "assisting countries to identify economic development projects which would provide farmers and others dependent on the illicit cultivation of narcotic plants with alternative economic and social opportunities." This raises issues which have been of serious and continuing concern to the Bank. I regret the delay in our response, due to the absence from Washington of the staff most directly concerned with these questions.

I fully share your concerns and we shall continue to explore the possibilities along the lines suggested in your letter. I am sure you understand there are formidable difficulties in trying to design effective measures in this area. Efforts to substitute other crops may not succeed because of the comparatively high income generated by drug crops and their suitability to the physical and socio-economic environments in which they are being grown. Profit motivated farmers may resist shifting to less remunerative crops which may be more difficult to cultivate or to transport to market. Furthermore the middleman profits in drug traffic are often so large that significant increases in producer prices can be absorbed should crop competition cause the supply to decline. Payment of subsidies to farmers who do not cultivate drug crops must be supported by a strong inspection system to avoid misapplication of funds. Direct prohibition of drug crop cultivation is often virtually impossible in remote, inaccessible areas.

It, therefore, appears essential that a broad based rural development approach be employed in attempting to reduce the production of drug crops. The remote areas where the crops are grown need to be opened up by building rural roads which facilitate enforcement of control measures, provide access for agricultural and social services staff and ease the transportation of usually more bulky alternative crops to market centers. Security of tenure for farmers needs to be included to encourage long-term improvement to the lands they cultivate. Social amenities must be provided. Implementation of such a project must be preceded by adequate preparation in which each component is thoroughly studied to ensure that the solutions adopted are both economically and socially acceptable. While such studies are time consuming, they are essential if costly failures are to be avoided.

This rural development approach to the problem was supported by staff of the U\& Fund for Drug Abuse Control with whom Bank staff discussed what we could do last November. During these discussions it was agreed that the Bank's country approach largely complements the UN Fund's multi-country regional action program.

With regard to the possible coffee project in a poppy growing area in Thailand, which you mention in your letter, preparation is continuing but progress has been slow. Coordination among the various agencies which must be involved is difficult. While Government is in principle committed to such a project, it may give it somewhat lower priority than is warranted, possibly because the principal beneficiaries from the project would be outside the country's political and economic main stream. We hope to begin implementation of this first project later this year.

In summary, in agreement with the country concerned, the Bank is prepared to strongly support efforts to develop viable projects which would lead to a reduction in poppy and coca cultivation. Where the Bank can assist in providing an effective alternative for the drug plant growers, the Bank will attempt to obtain assurances from the government that it will take all reasonable actions to prevent continuing drug plant cultivation in the project area.

We have discussed your proposal of January 5 on the expansion of oil production in developing countries. There is fairly complete agreement between your views and ours about the importance of this problem, the potential for future oil development in the LDCs, the deficiencies of the present effort, the difficulties to be overcome and consequently the need for increased external assistance and international cooperation. Also our work supports the assessment of the joint Canadian-Venezuelan study that world pressures on oil supplies are likely to become more severe in the mid1980s and that, therefore, it is urgent that measures be taken to accelerate exploration and development, particularly in those oil importing developing countries which have a potential of becoming more self-sufficient and might even contribute to exportable world oil supplies.

The main question is what activities can be undertaken usefully to supplement the considerable work that has been started in this field recently and the impact of which cannot yet be assessed.

We have some doubt as to whether it would be desirable to move to the kind of consultative group mechanism you have suggested. Our experience over the past two years is that each of the countries has its own approach to oil exploration and development from the technical as well as the political side. This is also true of the oil companies and other relevant investors, given the competitive nature of the business, the vested interests and the political sensitivity of oil matters. It would be extremely difficult, and perhaps impossible, to convene a consultative group which could consider, and agree on, matters such as guidelines for the allocation of funds, principles of cost and production sharing and compliance with contractual arrangements. The group would also have to be broadly representative which might make it quite cumbersome - for us to be associated with it formally.

Nonetheless, your suggestion that national oll companies may be in a different position than private companies to assist the exploration efforts of developing countries is worth exploring further. It would be useful to see whether the developing countries share this view of the difference between a national ofl company and a private corporation, and to develop more information about the present limitations on national oil companies to expand their technical services to the developing countries. I wonder therefore whether you would consider convening a meeting, at the invitation of Petro-Canada and Petroleos de Venezuela, which might include other national ofl companies, such as those of Morway and Italy, as well as some of the national ofl companies of the developing countries, such as those from Algeria, Mexico and India. Interested international institutions, such as the World Bank and the regional banks, might also be asked to attend. The purpose of the meeting might be to discuss the conclusions of your joint study. From there it would be a logical step to a discussion of the potential role of the national ofl companies. Such a meeting might help to identify what issues could be addressed fruitfully, what actions might be taken, and which organizations, private or public, national or international, might most suitably take the lead. Since the invitation would be a private one, and since there would be no presumption of eatablishing a continuing body, it would be easier to be selective about participants.

Regardless of whether you pursue this approach, we would of course very much like to take you up on your suggestion that Petro-Canada and the World Bank begin to cooperate bilaterally. We are already doing that with other national oil companies of developed countries, such as MORAD, ELF and ENI. In this way we can make the most effective use of the technical and financial assistance which we can provide jointly to specific developing countries. I would auggest therefore that direct contact be eatablished as soon as possible by an appropriate member of your staff with Mr. Yves Rovani, the Director of our Department of Energy, Water and Telecommunications. As you know, the Bank has formulated an ambitious expansion of lending for o11 and gas development over the next five years which involves projects in 25 developing countries and technical assistance to a further 15 . We would Ifke to axchange information and views with you regarding our respective plans in this field which, I an sure, can lead to a number of specific areas for cooperation on project aetivities.

Should you also decide to proceed with convening a conference, we would of course be glad to attend; and if we can be of assistance in preparing the agenda, we would be glad to do so.

Dear Mr. Saouma:
Thank you for your letter of January 10th in which you discussed the winding down of the CGFPI. Clearly your letter crossed with mine of January 6 th, in which I raised many of the same points that you did in your letter: I presume from your letter that you have accepted the report of the evaluators and will have no objection to it being circulated. Also I trust you agree with my suggestion that Mr. Mensah should remain in office until July 1, to ensure that there will be an orderly phasing out of all of the CGFPI activities. I agree with you that the co-sponsors should advise the World Food Council of our decision. For our part we will include reference to this in our report to the next meeting of the WFC, which I believe will take place in the second week in June in Mexico.

I note your comments about food plans and the follow-up to food plans. I an pleased to see that you are helping the Sudan to complete their plan and that UNDP might consider providing further support for work in Bangladesh. We are in touch with the authorities in Senegal and it is not unlikely that the Bank will be involved in supporting a nutrition project which is a direct outcome of the work on food plans in Senegal. Furthermore, as I wrote in my letter of January fth the World Bank will continue to take advantage of whatever opportunities present themselves to bring donors together to discuss the needs for financing investments in the food and agriculture sector.

I understand that the WFC and the OECD both publish reports on international resource flows for agriculture. We make information available to these two organizations for this purpose, and should FAO wish to continue the work done by the CGFPI on this subject, we shall be glad to make the same information available to your organization.

With your letter of January 5, you sent me a copy of your proposed interpretive ruling concerning limitations on loans made by national banks to foreign governments, their agencies and instrumentalities and invited my comments.

The World Bank is greatly interested in the lending activities of commercial banks in the United States and elsewhere insofar as they relate to loans to developing countries. As you know, loans from commercial banks have played a very important role in recent years in fostering the economic development of those countries and in many cases such loans have been made in close collaboration with the World Bank, sometimes taking the form of the co-financing of development projects.

However, I doubt whether it is appropriate for the World Bank, as an inter-governmental institution, to offer comments regarding proposed national regulations governing the lending activities of commercial banks. We shall look forward with great interest to the action that you eventually decide to take in this matter.

I believe you will be interested to know that the Bank has established an Advisory Panel on Education to examine and evaluate the Bank's activities in the past and under way in education and eralaing, and to recommend how Bank operations in the field may be made more effective in the future. This will be a report for the Bank's own gut dance. The approach is similar to one taken a year or so ago when, as you may know, an Advisory Panel on Population was established with essentially the same terms of reference for its area of concern.

The Panel has been holding its first meeting in the Bank this week, and expects to produce its report in nine months to a year. The members of the Panel ares Mr. David R. Dell, Executive Vice President, The Ford Foundation, uSA (Chairman); Dr, D.P. Singh, Vice Chancellor, Rajeadza Agricultural University, India; Mr. Sippanoadha Ketudat, Secretary General, National Education Commission, Thailand; Dr. Mary Jean Bowasn, Professor Emeritus of Zcomonies and of Education, Diversity of Chicago, USA; His Excellency Dr. Lameck Ret. Coma, Minister of Education, Zambia; Dr. G.L. Menekosso, Director, University Center for Health Sciences, University of Yaounde, Cameroon; Mr. Pablo Jose Dutra de Castro, General Director of Industrial Relations, Volkswagen, Brazil; and Dr. Louis Ktmerij, Rector, Institute of Social Studios, Netherlands. Very likely many, if not all of them, will be known to you. It is my understanding that the Chairman of the Panel, Mr. Bell, plans to call upon you in Paris.

It is now 15 years since the Bank made its first loan for education. We began by attempting to help to meet specific gaps in the manpower situation in individual developing countries and since that time our lending in the field of operation has extended over a great variety of projects. We felt that the time had come for independent review. I an hopeful, indeed confident, that the report of the Panel will achieve its objective, te provide the Bani with useful and practical recommendations for its guidance, in the interests of our member countries.

Thank you for your letter of December 16 in which you enquire about the orderly phasing out of the Consultative Group for Food Production and investment activities and the terminating of the staff.

I have accepted the draft report of the representatives of the cosponsors, and propose that it be finalised and distributed to the members of the CGFPI. I see no problem about fulfilling the recommendation on transferring the activities of the CGFPI to other agencies. In so far as the World Bank is concerned we will continue our on-going work in food planning and we will take advantage of opportunities for the Bank to bring donors together to discuss the needs for financing investments in the food and agriculture sector. I am also prepared to advise the World Food Council on our activities as suggested in the report. Since there are certain activities that will need to be integrated into work elsewhere, I propose that Mr. Mensah continue in Washington until July 1 to ensure that there will be an orderly phasing out of all of the CGFPI activities.

In this regard I understand that FAO is considering helping the governments of Bangladesh and the Sudan to strengthen their food planning capability. I welcome such a move and foresee a possibility that it might lead to more effective investment in food production in these countries.

I foresee no problem about terminating the very small staff of the CGFPI. Ambassador Martin retires on the 15 th of this month. I understand the others on the staff have no difficulty in being relocated.

I propose to make the report on the future of the CGFPI available to our Board of Directors. If possible I would like to be able to inform our Board of your views on the report and arrangements for any follow-up on the recommendations in the report.
